Change to the start of day process

Every session staff analyse and explain their exam results and this year I added a section at the end to ask departments what more could be done at a whole school level to support high attainment and achievement for all. The answer from almost every department was -improve punctuality and attendance and we will increase attainment and achievement. The numbers are simple- 95% attendance which sounds really good still amount to missing 60 Blocks or class time or 50 hours in a school session.

To support this request, this session we have been trying to unpick some of the changes that we had to put in place due to COVID. Unfortunately, as we all know there is a huge distance between changing processes and changing hearts, minds and habits. Attendance and punctuality in general remain a concern for us, but attendance at the start of day is at an unacceptable level.

The most recent Parent Council meeting gave me an insight into the problem when parents shared that their children questioned when school actually started and whether Registration counted. It does count but it is becoming less purposeful because of the number of pupils coming in at the end of it and we no longer run assemblies at that time because too many pupils miss the messages through poor punctuality.

Therefore, we are going to trial a new system starting next term. Planned for change of timetable (15th May), we are not changing the timings of the school day but we are changing the sequence- the school day will still start at 8.40 but that will be the first class. When it finishes at 9.30 we will have a ten minute registration block allowing regular assemblies and better information sharing.

We hope that moving to this firmer start to the day makes things easier for parents at home- please encourage your young person to be in the building by 8.35 and at the door of their first lesson by 8.40 next session. If you drop your child off, can I ask that you bring forward your departure time if you are ever getting notifications of lateness in registration. I am aware that delays in bus arrivals will therefore impact Block one classes but we believe that these are rare enough to be offset by the improvements in attendance and time spent in lessons.

CCTV

You will be aware that the school had a series of break-ins back before Christmas. One of the consequences of this was a review of the security of the school building. Out of that review came the decision to improve the CCTV presence inside and around the school building. Over the Easter holidays approximately 40 cameras will be installed in and around the school. Beyond building security, we believe that this will increase the areas of the school that pupils feel safe in and reduce anti-social behaviour. I will provide further information once the system is in place.

Next term

If the term just finished is a long hard grind, the term to come is characterised by change. Senior pupils go on Study Leave on Friday 21st April- some never to return. S1, 2 and 3 pupils start their new classes on 15th May, S4 and 5 on 29th May (except for a small number who have an exam after that time). Some staff will be leaving us in the summer and early next term I will be interviewing for 8 new staff. We will also be interviewing for pupil leadership positions in most year groups in May and June. Finally, in June we welcome our new S1s on a transition visit as preparation for moving up here in August. Hopefully the sun will shine a lot more as well.

Building works

Plans are in place for some further internal improvements to the school over the summer holidays to support science and PE. We eagerly await the outcome of the Council's capital review in May which should clarify the size and speed of further changes and additions to the school. I will update all parents as soon as we have information to share.
