As a school, we are committed to trying to reduce the cost of the school day and to help our children and their families through tough economic times.

We know that some families may be struggling and want to do all we can to help. Within this leaflet you will find information about some of the help and support on offer. Please get in touch if you need further help or information.



Free school meals and clothing grants

We know that not everyone who is entitled to free school meals takes the council up on the offer. If you are eligible, we would encourage you to make sure you receive them. This enables pupils to have a full hot meal every day and comes with a grant of £150 towards clothing (£140 for primary school pupils). Some of the funding the school receives is also related to our free school meals numbers.

To receive free school meals and assistance with school clothing, your household must be in receipt of any one of the following:

- Income Support
- Universal Credit (where the monthly earned income does not exceed £660).
- Income-based Job Seekers Allowance
- Any income related element of Employment and Support Allowance
- Child Tax Credit, but not in receipt of Working Tax Credit, and your income is less than £17,005 (as assessed by the HMRC)
- Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit and an income below £7,920 (as assessed by the HMRC)
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Pension Credit Guaranteed Credit.

Breakfast Club

Breakfast Club is run in room 11 from 8am to 8.30am every day. Toast and cereal are always available and there are occasional treats such as pancakes and eggy bread.

Free Clothing

We always have a small reserve of school uniform in the school which we can distribute to families who are having problems buying such items. Please contact your child's guidance teacher for more information.

Education Maintenance Allowance

Further financial support is available for pupils aged between 16 and 19 who come from a low-income household. This is called the Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) – a weekly payment of £30 during term-time.

To be eligible, your family household income must be less than:

- £24,421- for households with one dependent child
- £26,884 for households with two or more dependent children

Young Persons' Free Bus Travel Scheme for Under 22s

You may or may not be aware that young people (aged under 22 years) living in Scotland are eligible for free nationwide bus travel so pupils cannot only get around the local area but can travel further afield to Glasgow, Aberdeen, Edinburgh and other towns and cities.

To access the scheme, you must apply for a new National Entitlement Card (NEC) card.

Those aged between 5 and 15 must have a parent, guardian, or carer apply for a new NEC card on their behalf. Those aged between 16 and 21 should apply themselves.

You need to have a new NEC Card in order to access the travel scheme, as old Young Scot Cards will not be accepted, and you will be charged the normal fare.

Period Equity

The Scottish Government has pledged to end period poverty in the country and, as part of this initiative, we always ensure there are free period products for pupils to access easily during term time and over the school holiday period. These are available from the school office.

There are also a number of community collection points for both pupils and their families. Free period products are available in community premises, such as High Life Highland leisure centres, libraries and Council service points. They will also be provided through community larders and foodbanks through our partnership work with Cfine.

Highland Food Banks

A food bank is a charitable system that provides emergency food supplies for people unable to buy food themselves because of financial distress.

There are a number of food banks across Highland. To receive help from one of these food banks, you need to be referred by one the food bank's partner agencies. Examples of who can refer you include GPs, health visitors, social workers or your local Citizens Advice Bureau.

Once you receive a referral, you will be given a voucher to take along to your local food bank. You will be provided with a three-day food supply, along with recipes to help you make the most of this food.

Food banks rely on donations from the public, often through a collection organised at a local supermarket or church.
